Highlights include: being joined by 27 Spanish pupils from I.E.S Margarita Salas for our exchange programme; some of our pupils exploring leadership principles with Toby Garbett who represented Great Britain at the World Rowing Championships and our Spring Music Concert, which was an absolute triumph, show casing the talent, dedication and passion of all involved.....and it's not over yet! We have 68 pupils flying the flag for Kings' on their hockey tour in Holland over the Easter break and we're finishing the term in style as the Year 11 pupils and members of staff undertake the infamous King's Got Tough course!

Further good news to share with you is that this week we have been joined by the Hampshire Inspection and Advisory Service for our annual school review. The advisors spent a full day in school; visiting lessons, speaking to pupils and meeting with staff. They explored a wide range of aspects of the school including safeguarding, the pastoral and academic curriculum, pupils' learning, attendance and Special Educational Needs. We are very pleased that feedback included: recognising the schools' ambition for all pupils to be successful; effective safeguarding of pupils; the strong pupil-teacher relationships and engagement in learning in lessons. They also recognised the considerable work by all staff that has gone into the school continuing to improve since their last visit. Governors will be sharing more of the feedback with staff at the start of next term.

I recently shared with you the main themes from the recent Parent Survey, in which I outlined that we wanted to involve pupils, parents, staff and Governors in further developing our school values so that they become central to our culture. I am pleased to share that the recent Year assemblies, led by Mr Rossiter, have focused on this theme. We will continue to build on these assemblies across next term, as we refine our values, rewards and recognition programme. Celebrating the personal successes of so many of our pupils is central to the culture of our Kings' family – whether that's in recognising the quiet kindnesses of pupils to each other or the stellar performances of pupils in a public arena.

Our staff and pupils will be exploring these themes at the start of term and I invite you to take part in our Shaping the Future Forum on Tuesday 25th April. SPRING CONCERT



For some weeks now, Kings' School has been filled with the sound of flutes and clarinets, voices and violins, and every instrument imaginable, as our prodigiously talented pupils rehearsed and rehearsed and rehearsed some more, ahead of the grand Spring Concert. On Monday night, 27th March, an audience of parents and friends gathered in the school hall to enjoy the culmination of these many hours of hard work. Our extraordinary children, and our wonderful music teachers, did not disappoint.

The evening began with our Year 7 choir performing When I Grow Up from Matilda, demonstrating clear diction and a cheeky sense of humour as they tackled Tim Minchin's challenging score with aplomb.

A confident saxophone solo from Gabriel followed, before the Junior Steel Band had us all tapping our feet in time to Mama Mia! By Abba. It was a struggle to not get up and dance.

A change of mood, next, as cool, sophisticated, swinging sounds of the Clarinet Group, relaxed us all with Shadow of Your Smile. Special mention should be made of Tyler who provided perfectly rhythmic drumming accompaniment.

The audience was now entertained by our Main Choir clapping and swaying their way through Pentatonix' Sing! And then next up on stage were Nafisah and Klara who played a delicately beautiful flute duet, the JS Bach Little Fugue in G Minor. They impressed with their lovely clear tone.

The Chamber Choir shared their skills and brilliance in their performance of All Star, which featured a number of confident soloists and vocal percussion. In contrast, the Flute Group demonstrated their lovely ensemble playing and particularly clear top notes, in the Game of Thrones theme.

Now it was the turn of Phillip and Robert, who performed the Tom Odell song, Another Love, with exceptional skill. Phillip's expertise on the piano was perfectly matched by Robert's sensitive handling of the lyrics.



The string Orchestra followed this with a spine-tingling performance of Coldplay's Viva la Vida, and then Laura, playing a wonderful cello solo, concluded the first half. Her Saint-Saens Allegro Appassionato had scintillating attack and confidence.

Suitably refreshed from a well organised interval, thanks to the KSA, the audience settled in for the second half. The Jazz Band, with Skye on vocals, gave us a brilliantly brassy and sumptuously sassy rendition of Feeling Good, before the full Orchestra, under the baton of Mr Olexa, entertained us with highlights from the Harry Potter score.

Another change of mood as Esther performed Scarlatti's Sonata in E with brio and wonderful sensitivity, and then the Brass Group swung into Can You Feel the Love Tonight, with a full rich sound.

Vocal soloist Hannah shared her beautiful tone in Abba's The Winner Takes it All. Her wonderfully big notes were well supported by the lovely accompaniment.

Another soloist, Sianne, played Allegro Brilliante by Ten Have, with true musicality – allegro vivace indeed.

Our brilliant Vocal Octet were up next, performing Sleep by Eric Whitacre. This complex choral work with its clashing chords and devilishly difficult lines of tight 8-part harmony, was the perfect showcase for our extraordinarily gifted vocalists.

Rowan on saxophone came next, this time accompanied by Zach, producing a fabulously brisk and lively sound in Sax in the City.

Could this extraordinary concert get any better? Could our talented musicians pull one last musical rabbit out of the hat? It seems the answer is yes. Thomas on cello, joined by Mr Olexa, also on cello, and Esther on the piano, making up a sublime trio of performers, concluded the evening with a dazzling performance of Vivaldi's Concerto for Two Cellos in G minor (1st movement – Allegro) It certainly was Allegro con Brio, and this fabulous display of virtuosity put a smile on everyone's face.

Bravo to all involved – Mr Clarke, Mr Wood, and Mr Olexa and our hardworking peripatetic teachers, and mostly, our gifted, talented and fantastically motivated pupils.









SPORT AT KINGS'

It's been a bumper term of sport at Kings' with dozens of teams competing at local, county and even regional level across a range of activities. Some of the many highlights include:

The absolute flag bearers, the U12 Girls' hockey team, who having finished as runners up in the Hampshire In2 Hockey county championships travelled to Reading to compete in the regional finals. They defeated sides from Berkshire, Oxford and the Hampshire champions before being pipped to the regional crown in the final by the Buckingham winners via the agony of penalty strokes. But, as regional runners up this is greatest Kings' girls' hockey achievement in over 33 years!

Not far behind are the U13 Boys' hockey team who are Eastleigh and Winchester District champions after an emphatic 5-1 win over Thornden. They bid to go one better against Brighton Hill in the Hampshire Cup semi-final.

In rugby the U15 Boys' team eventually succumbed to a 14-7 defeat to Westgate in the Hampshire cup semi-final, whilst the U14 Girls' gave a brilliant account of themselves, finishing as runners up in the Hampshire festival. The U12 Boys' also impressed finishing third in the top pool at their Hampshire festival.

In netball, the U12 A continue to impress and following a 100% record at a recent tournament are through to the next round of the Hampshire Youth Games qualifiers. The U13 B team recently won a district competition and the U14 A and B teams enjoyed some excellent wins and superb hospitality at tournaments at Embley.

And in basketball the U14s finished runners up in their Southampton league plate final following a 52-43 defeat to Toynbee.

HAMPSHIRE BOOK AWARD 2023

Earlier this term our Year 8s were invited to submit written applications, outlining why they believed they would make good judges in the annual Hampshire Book Award. Only twelve are selected from each school and once again, Kings' pupils showed excellent communication skills as well as all being passionate and enthusiastic readers.

On Monday 20th March, the shortlist of recently published YA fiction was announced.

The excitement was building as, one by one, the six shortlisted books were revealed, and our judges sat in silent anticipation, smiling and nodding and occasionally gasping. And then our Year 8 judging panel got down to work, reading. Between now and the end of June they will attend regular meetings to discuss the merits (or otherwise) of these recently published Young Adult novels. The aims of the HBA are:

- To promote the enjoyment of reading
- To foster a reading ethos within the school
- To draw attention to the most rewarding and accessible fiction for the age group

• To challenge students to critically assess books and to make a reasoned argument in group discussions.

The Hampshire Book Award is one of the most well-respected literary awards, particularly among the authors themselves, as it is the only book prize judged solely by children. Whilst Mrs Miles arranges the meetings and steers the conversations, the ultimate decision rests entirely with our Year 8 judging team. Over the next three months they will become highly critical readers, looking at the "Three Es" of reading – Enjoyment, Enrichment and Engagement, as they consider every aspect of what makes a book a page-turner and a possible future classic.

In past years our judges have selected books such as Percy Jackson, Skullduggery Pleasant, Private Peaceful, and The Hunger Games. What will they discover this year?
