What attracted you to a career in teaching?



Before going into teaching I originally worked with professional sports clubs doing both coaching and performance analysis. I had always been interested in undertaking a job that allowed me to be active and working with a wide variety of people. I soon began working at my first school as a part of the PE Department, supporting Maths before transitioning to join the Maths team full time. Beyond this I have then progressed from my initial role as a tutor to joining the Year Teams at my previous school as well as Kings'. I enjoy the daily challenges of pupils learning new content, and achieving success in topics they didn't think they initially could! As well as this it is privilege to support our pupils outside the classroom and watch them grow as individuals. No day in a school is the same, but it is fantastic to see our young people excelling and forming wonderful relationships within our school community.

Tell us why pupils enjoy coming to your lessons?




READING RECOMMENDATIONS



Spotlight on a Pupil

Over the summer, I attended the World Scout Jamboree, which is the world's largest scouting event, held once every 4 years all around the world, and this year it was in South Korea. 57,000 members of the scouting movement from across the globe came together in a campsite on the south-west coast of the Korean Peninsula (near SaeManGeum) to take part in the event and all the activities involved.

As a part of the UK contingent, I had to fundraise around £4000 over 2 years, alongside training camps and cultural days within my unit travelling with me. I was a part of the Unit 59 Hampshire Knightingales, made of scouts from all over Hampshire and we all met for training weekends once or twice a month to prepare for the trip, in July/August this year, which was so much fun, meeting people from around my local area who were interested in similar things to me. Quite a few of our group had never been on a plane before, so when we took off it was a whole new experience.

Whilst still being fun, there were a few setbacks while onsite. Unfortunately, there was severe flooding in that part of the country in the run up to the event, followed by extreme heatwaves as we all arrived. The temperature reached around 40 degrees, but at 95% humidity, most weather stations put out a 'real feel' of 50, and began issuing public safety warnings, asking people to not be outside or take part in any strenuous activity. For all of our safety, the UK contingent team decided to remove all their Scouts from the site, and put us into hotels in Seoul, the capital, much further North. As the biggest contingent, with over 4,000 young people and around 9% of all members attending, we made a big impact decision and other countries followed us away. After we arrived in Seoul however, we received news from the site that a typhoon was headed directly over the area, and the rest of the countries would have to leave as well, so we were no longer the only scouts in Seoul.

Even though things didn't go quite right, I still had an amazing time, I met people from so many other countries, and am still in contact with lots of them. So many of the activities would have been incredible to try; e.g. paragliding and quadbiking, and it was still the most incredible experience. Because we weren't onsite, I got to experience so much Korean culture (like the traditional dress, Hanbok!) and learn about things I never would have known The next Jamboree will be in Poland, 2027, which, despite all the challenges we faced, I would still encourage every single member of the Scouting movement to go on. It was really a once in a lifetime experience.

The Open Day will showcase what the maritime industry does for Portsmouth, maritime employment, and also efforts to protect the maritime and port environment.


