### 30 years of Pupil Support



The Kings' School pupil support department was established 30 years ago with just a handful of pupils. Over the years it has grown and flourished, becoming an integral and valued part of our school. The most notable expansion occurred in February 2002 with the opening of the Therapy room, where our regular physiotherapists work with pupils during the school day. Without this highly skilled treatment, some of our pupils would not be able to remain in school for the entire day. Our five trained staff, allow for a greater range of time slots and reduces the loss of physio due to illness. We now have a department of over 40 LSA's (Learning Support Assistants) who provide support and assistance to pupils, with a variety of needs, across the year groups. We are incredibly proud of our Pupil Support department and all the work the team does and has done over the years to create a fun, welcoming and fully accessible environment that the pupils enjoy coming to, providing support inside and outside the classroom. The department has purchased 10 sports wheelchairs enabling both able bodied and disabled pupils to take part in the after school Basketball Club. Swimming continues as an inclusive activity with Oskings now taking part too, and we are always delighted to see the whole department heavily involved in our flagship event, school Sports Day. Many of our Pupil Support alumni have gone on to achieve great things and we celebrate their successes, large and small. Lara Clarke, a former senior prefect and senior librarian, went on to read Psychology and Linguistics at Oxford. Lavanyah Singh is soon off to The University of London to study economics. Jamie Winduss, now at Reading university is an enthusiastic rider and aspirant para-Equestrian. We celebrate these and many more successes, including George Gray, successful at Wheelchair basketball, Thames Valley King Team; Craig Boardman paralympian, attended the David Weir Academy; Tom Kelly - Powerchair footballer who plays for a national team; Hannah Burkhill, currently studying law at Bournemouth university with an in-house carer and Lewis Lloyd is playing wheelchair basketball for London Titans The last word goes to past pupil Harvey Matthewson who has expressed a wish to return to the school, to speak to current pupils at Kings' about his experiences of the department. He said: "My experiences are especially relevant because I know that I wouldn't have the life I have now without attending Kings' as it is a school which promotes opportunity and gives so much care to its pupils. I will forever have a debt to the school and it would be a pleasure to speak (to current pupils) in an attempt to repay the school a little."

But as has been their way throughout their time at Kings', the U16s bounced back through an Alex Potts goal just before half time to pull it back to 4-1.



England U18 hopeful Wedderburn, the most recent of the alumni side. donned the burgundy he wore with such distinction in the second half and had an immediate impact, bringing the creative force of Joe Jenkinson and Charlie Hoad into the game far more. But it was the Alumni who once again scored first with Sam Green blasting an unstoppable reverse shot into the far corner following excellent link up play with his brother and fellow UWE student Oli. An unlikely comeback from the U16s then looked on the cards following a string of good saves from Connor Baverstock, and then the completion of a superb Alex Potts hat-trick. Year 10 Seb Eaton, playing the second half for the U16s kept the tie alive with a miraculous triple save but with the team pushing for another goal he was left stranded for a final Alumni goal.

There was the usual mutual respect at the end and the Alumni then enjoyed catching up over stories of Dutch hockey tours and famous wins over fee paying schools whilst enjoying the barbeque and bar at the Kings' Fayre.
