Hundreds of skaters have attempted to set a new Guinness World Record. Geoff Else, a professional skateboarder and coach from Winchester, gathered 360 pupils from Kings' School in an attempt to conduct the largest skateboard lesson. The current record, set in 2012 in California, is 311 people in one lesson - but Mr Else believes that record has now been broken.

We now wait for confirmation from Guinness World Record judges.

The Guinness World Record rules stipulate that each skater must have their own board and helmet and they must do at least six different skills in a 30-minute lesson. Mr Birch, head of PE, said he "jumped at the chance" when Mr Else got in contact about the idea.

"The whole school community is really excited about this opportunity," Mr Birch said.







#### HENRY SCHACHTER HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR

#### A REPORT BY BELLA IN YEAR 11

The week before half term I and a small group of other year 11 students were lucky enough to be able to listen to Henry Schachter talk about his experiences and memories during the Holocaust. Henry started his story from when he was just a small baby living with his parents in Poland. He described how the antisemitic views grew drastically whilst living in Poland so he and his family emigrated to Germany. He talked about how for a short amount of time Jewish people were accepted into Germany before World War One ended and the Nazis began to rise in power. Henry spoke about how most Jewish people that had emigrated from Poland had their German Citizenship revoked and how they had to travel back to Poland where they were forced to wear the yellow Star of David and had to carry ID cards with Jew stamped onto them.

Henry then continued to explain how the situation across Germany and Poland worsened leaving his family with no choice but to go into hiding – this is when Henry was around 9 months old, and his family found themselves in the situation of terror that they would be found by the Nazis as Henry was unable to understand the situation and would start crying. The family then came out of hiding to protect the other families that they were in hiding with and were forced to keep out of the public eye as much as possible although at this time it was proving nearly impossible. One day when Henry's father was out, he was stopped and asked for his ID card which he did not have with him so was sentenced to 10 days in prison. At this point Henry's family had to do something as the Nazis were now most likely going to come after his whole family.





#### Henry's father was able to get papers to travel to Germany on a work basis allowing then to set up and try and find a place where his family was able to settle. Once this was achieved Henry and his mother had to make the difficult and illegal journey to go and join his father. Henry spoke about the fake papers that his mother had to acquire and about the horrific journey that he and his mother had to make in a state of constant fear through a forest where they could have been found at any point. Once they managed to safely reach Germany, they were able to live in less fear for a few months until the Nazis gained more control and their lives where at stake, so they had to do something.

When Henry was about two, he was placed into a fostering scheme ran by Christians to protect Jewish children by relocating them with a Christian family and completely changing their identity. Henry described his new "mama and papa" fondly however he began to recount when he had last seen his mother on his fifth birthday. He was only able to spend an hour with her and when she left, he was so upset that he refused to give her a hug. This is what Henry said is the greatest regret of his life and he became very emotional as did many Year 11s due to the moving nature of his story. He then described how a few days later his mother was taken away to a Nazi death camp and was killed in the gas chambers as was his father. He described the multiple memories that Henry made with his adopted parents sheltered away from the war. When the war finished Henry began to tell us of the miracle that occurred that allowed him to re unite with his family and his identity. His uncle was travelling for work when he realised that in his distant state, he had gotten on the wrong tram so then when he got off, he saw a young boy skipping on the other side of the road who then ran up to him shouting "papa" and ran towards him. This young boy was Henry confusing his uncle for his father. Because of this simple mistake Henry was able to learn his family history and reunite with his identity.

It was a real privilege for us to hear first hand the experiences endured by Henry during this terrible time in history, meeting him and asking questions and understanding what his family went through.

Years and years of use by lively teenagers have left the room looking a little shabby and in need of some TLC. And I am happy to say that there are plans afoot to do just that.

The smart new library is due to open its doors in September after a long-awaited refurbishment. As well as cosmetic improvements such as a new carpet and window blinds, there will be structural changes – much more than just a lick of paint. The room is to be divided into a dedicated classroom area, and a separate reading library. The removal of the temporary walls will open up the Fiction area, and new seating will allow pupils to read on their own in quiet spaces or with friends.

Additional space will be made available for displays and our book stock will be showcased on fixed bays as well as movable shelving. We think a fresh new reading space is just what the Kings' Community needs, and we look forward to welcoming one and all to our sparkling new library.


